<u>Résumé :</u>

The globalization of economic activity has led to a constant increase in the degree of internationalization of patent applications: companies in the most advanced and the fastest growing economies increasingly file their patent abroad, leading to a severe increase in patent applications in major regional patent offices. To solve this so-called "backlog" issue patent offices are under pressure to collaborate further in order to process patent applications faster and exploit the benefits of a mutual recognition process. The conference will illustrate recent tendencies and important issues at stake, especially for the US patent system and the European Patent system. The two systems actually suffer from different types of challenges, which have implication both for policy makers and for the users of patent systems.

<u>Biographie :</u>

Bruno van Pottelsberghe is Dean of the Solvay Brussels School of Economics and Management (SBS-EM), at the Université Libre de Bruxelles. He is Full-Time Professor and as holder of the Solvay S.A. Chair of Innovation, he teaches courses on the economics and management of innovation and intellectual property. During his academic career, Bruno van Pottelsberghe has been visiting researcher or professor at Columbia Business school (NYC), Hitotsubashi University (Tokyo), MITI Research institute (Tokyo), Stellenbosch Business School, and Barcelona University. He is senior Fellow at the University of Sussex, School of economics and Business.

For his research activities, he is affiliated to ECARES and CEB. His research interests focus on the effectiveness of science and technology policies, patent policies, regulations and innovation. He has so far supervised about 12 Ph.D. research fellows. He has co-authored numerous papers in scientific journals like Research Policy, Industrial and Corporate Change, Oxford Bulletin of Economics and Statistics, Journal of Economic Surveys, and the European Journal of Law and Economics.

Bruno van Pottelsberghe was Chief Economist of the European Patent Office (EPO) from 2005 to 2007, he is Advisor to the President and Rector of the ULB for technology transfer issues since 2004 and is Senior Research Fellow at Bruegel, a Brussels-based Think-Tank since 2007
